EQIP

- Planners are completing contracts and obtaining signatures for the 1st batch of preapproved applications for FY-23.
- Planners have been given a deadline of 6/9/2023 for contract completion to allow time for my review. The obligation deadline is 6/16/2023.
- We will continue accepting applications, which will be batched accordingly.
- We will be moving into 2nd batch applications due to the expenditure of current funds.

EQIP/CIC

• Contracts are being developed for participant signatures. These are five-year contracts with a \$200,000 payment limitation. Payment limitations are separate from EQIP.

EQIP/IRA (Inflation Reduction Act)

• Contracts are being developed for participant signatures. Funds are targeted towards Climate Smart Ag. Practices. The categories are Soil Health, Nitrogen Mgt., Livestock Partnership, Grazing & Pasture, Agroforestry, Forest and Upland Wildlife habitat, Energy, and Wetlands. The funding level for FY-23 was \$787,000.

AMA/RMA

Contracts are being developed for participant signatures.

CSP/IRA

- Like EQIP/IRA, but it is for participants that sign up through CSP for the same targeted Climate Smart Ag. Practice categories.
- We received two applications for the first batch with an assessment and ranking deadline of 5/26/2023.
- Applications are currently being assessed and ranked.

CSP

- We are accepting applications for FY-23 CSP Classic. The deadline to apply for 1st batch was March 24, 2023.
- We received two applications.
- Applications are currently being assessed and ranked.

WRE

• We are accepting applications for FY-23.

RCPP

• The Delaware Bay/ Inland Bay project for cover crops. District planners are completing assessments and rankings for contract preapproval. There are 11 applications on file for FY-23. Most, if not all, of the funding will be utilized.

SEDIMENT AND STORMWATER PROGRAM May 2023

He and Faith work together on home construction complaints and contacting non-compliant builders.

Program Updates and News

Tax Ditch and Drainage Programs

- The Tax Ditch Officer Newsletter was distributed at the end of April to all Tax Ditch officers and partner agency staff who have subscribed to the content.
- Tax Ditch warrant changes approved by the District Boards were filed with the respective county Tax Offices.
- The Tax Ditch Program hosted an exhibit to spread Tax Ditch Awareness at the 2023 Water Family Fest and Native Plant Sale on May 6 at the James Farm Ecological Preserve. We interacted with more than 200 visitors.

Staffing Updates

- Permit and Data Specialist Karyssa Gortz was hired and started on April 24, 2023. She comes to us as a Salisbury University graduate with an Earth Science degree. In her role here, she will process and track all requests for technical assistance and identify environmental permit needs for tax ditch and public ditch projects.
- Engineering Program Manager Amy Reed has accepted the Engineering Program Manager I position and began in this role on May 8, 2023. As an Engineer in the Drainage Program, Amy will continue in her role and responsibilities of reviewing and designing the RC&D and tax ditch projects process. Amy will manage the Drainage Program Engineering Team and Engineering Professional Services contract held by the Division.

Sediment & Stormwater Program

Staffing Updates/Vacancies

• Posted vacancy - <u>Stormwater Engineer I</u> - This position reviews sediment and stormwater plans for state and federal projects, providing guidance to the Delegated Agencies, consultants, the regulated community, and public and private agencies, organizations, or individuals.

Nonpoint Source and Chesapeake Implementation Programs

• The Nonpoint Source Program hosted its biennial Partnership Meeting on Wednesday, May 3, 2023, at DNREC's Lewes facility. Approximately 55 people attended the event. Partners, including local, state, federal, university, and non-profit organizations, gave presentations on BMP projects funded by water quality grants, including the NPS Section 319 and Chesapeake Bay Implementation Grant. This event also brought together various stakeholders for networking as the NPS Program utilizes water quality grant funds as efficiently as possible to address impairments.

Spotlight

At the Nonpoint Source Program Biennial Partnership Meeting, several members of the CPS staff presented new programs and project updates. These included program updates from the Delaware Conservation Assistance Program (DeCAP), the Forest Buffer Incentive Program, and the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP). The Drainage and Nonpoint Source Programs also provided project updates.






Updates:

AGRICULTURAL CONSERVATION PROGRAM REPORT May 2023

Grants

- There are discussions regarding the NRCS DACD Contribution Agreement that begins October 1, 2023. NRCS would like to have this finalized by May 23.
- As part of another contribution agreement with NRCS, the filming of a TV commercial promoting the NRCS Black Duck Program was today. Chad Mitchell was the spokesperson, along with Chase Colmorgen from Ducks Unlimited. The commercial will begin airing in late July and should run through September. Stay tuned.
- As part of that agreement, there is funding to develop a film and a new commercial promoting NRCS climate-smart practices. We are still finalizing the spokesperson for that commercial but should have that figured out soon. It will run along the same timeline as the Black Duck commercial ending around the EQIP first batch deadline in October.

Cost-Share

- Cover Crop destruction forms have been coming in, and the correlating inspections are ongoing. Farmers have until June 1st to submit their destruction certification forms to receive payment. A 30-day extension may be granted for soil health purposes, i.e., if a farmer wants to plant green after June 1, a request can be filed to receive approval to destroy the cover crop after the June 1st deadline. Reminder postcards are being mailed on May 18th to those producers that have not already certified their cover crop destruction.
- As of May 12th, SCD has made 109 payments totaling about \$1.7 Million for 31,693 acres of cover crops destroyed and 2,029.2 acres harvested. I will provide up-to-date numbers at the board meeting.
- Bobbi is preparing applications for the cost-share sign-up from June 12-July 28. Staff is meeting internally on Friday, May 19th, to discuss updates to the Cost-Share policy and guidelines for FY 2024.

3921 Funds

- Letters were mailed at the end of March, reminding tax ditch officers to submit their mowing and bonding bills by July 1 for payment.
- Letters were also mailed on May 12th to all tax ditch officers to explain the application process along with the fact sheet. As last year, officers should call the office and tell us what they want to apply for. Chana will create the applications and mail them, email them, fax them, or have them ready when the officers stop by the office to sign.

Miscellaneous

• The Delaware Envirothon was held at the Aquatic Resource Center in Smyrna on April 27, 2023. Wilmington Charter Team A won the event. Sussex County had a new team participate this year, Sussex Central. Seaford High School had signed up to participate but had to back out at the last minute. Sussex Tech has participated for many years and had a team enter.

DISTRICT COORDINATOR'S REPORT May 23, 2023

Expedited Plan Review Bill

No additional activity has been associated with HB 101 since the last update. We have prepared a letter to the Sussex Legislators and sponsor of the bill outlining our concerns that we expect to be delivered early next week.

Agriculture's Role in Water Quality Improvements

The <u>attached</u> article appeared in the May 1 Bay Journal. I found it to be worth the read. While the article still places much of the clean-up burden on agriculture, it does an excellent job of addressing the challenges faced by ag producers, especially the smaller ones. Throughout the article, you will see examples of many of the issues the District is regularly working on, and it looks like the debate over results and the associated costs will continue for years to come.

Governor's Conservation Awards

DACD recognized its award recipients at a ceremony on Tuesday, May 2, with Rich Rishel (Carl M. Freeman Companies) being recognized as the Urban Award winner from Sussex, Guy Phillips (Georgetown) recognized as the Agricultural Award winner from Sussex, and Rep. Ron Gray was recognized as the DACD Legislator of the Year.

NRCS Contribution Agreement

DACD and the three Districts have started our conversations with NRCS on a new contribution agreement to fund services the Districts provide for NRCS beginning October 1, 2024. Earlier this week, we received the first proposal from NRCS that resulted in a \$46,650 reduction (-9.6%) in funding for SCD. This proposal was a tough pill to swallow, given that NRCS is receiving an additional \$1.0 million in Technical Assistance funding in FY24. Additionally, there are numerous changes to the proposed deliverables in the contract, including NRCS' desire for each district to hire a conservation technician to add to our staff. Unfortunately, this cannot be supported with the funding proposed by NRCS. I have included a comparison of the proposed agreement with the highlighted changes. NRCS is looking to have the proposal finalized by May 26.

Access Blocked to Tax Ditch Right of Way

We see more instances of access to Tax Ditch Right-of-Ways being blocked on DelDOT roads due to installing new guardrails or extending existing ones. New transportation regulations and traffic safety guidelines are driving DelDOT's changes. The unintended consequence is the lack of access and all of the issues that go along with that. We will continue gathering and sharing data with you as we learn more.

Board Compensation Committee

I have attached the proposal presented to the Board in April. As a follow-up from the April Board meeting, a compensation committee composed of R.C. Willin, Willin Farms (Seaford), Jay Baxter, Baxter Farms (Georgetown), and Ring Lardner, Davis, Bowen & Friedel Engineers (Milford) met on May 12 and after discussion supported Option 1 of the attached proposal. Additionally, they recommended that SCD consider a policy that would adjust compensation with an annual cost of living adjustment reviewed by the compensation committee every 2-3 years to confirm the appropriate figures.

SCD Employee Appreciation Breakfast

SCD staff gathered on Wednesday, May 10, where the employees were formally thanked for all of their contributions that led to the success of SCD. Specific recognition was given to Dan Holston (Ag Program) and Craig Mills (Stormwater Program) for 15 years of service and Dan Lee (Accountant) for ten years of service. Owen Lenkner (Ag Program) was also recognized for his upcoming retirement on May 26.

Community Reinvestment Fund Application

SCD submitted a request for funding for \$117,130 for complete paving on the Manchester Manor RC&D Project. Senator Richardson and Representative Dukes had already provided CTF funding for the drainage and paving. Still, this additional amount will allow for complete milling and overlay of the streets in the community upon completion of the drainage project.

Tax Ditch Pilot Program Continuation

With the success of the first two years of this program, we are in discussions with members of the General Assembly regarding funding the program for an additional three years. This will most likely need to be added as epilogue language in the FY24 Bond Bill.
